Israel turns 75 this year. However we feel about Israel as a political entity, it is part of our heritage, part of our story, part of our identity. Rarely do we think about this connection more than during the series of holidays I like to call "the *yoms*". We begin mid-April (18/19) with *Yom HaShoah*. Just one week earlier, we will have celebrated our exodus from Egypt. And just one week later, we find the second and third *yoms* back-to-back: *Yom HaZikaron* on April 24/25 and *Yom HaAtzmaut* on April 25/26.

For some reason this year I can really see that full picture. The emotional roller coaster of the Jewish narrative: At *Pesach* (Passover), we re-tell one of our most important ancient stories. We remember and celebrate moving from captivity to liberation. Seven days after the last day of *Pesach*, on *Yom HaShoah* (Holocaust Remembrance Day), we

remember being forced back into captivity and the accompanying genocide, commemorating our losses and crying out, Never again! Then eight days later from that, on *Yom HaZikaron* (Israeli Memorial Day) we remember Israel's fallen soldiers, turning immediately at sunset to *Yom HaAtzmaut* (Israeli Independence Day), when we celebrate the creation of the State of Israel. It is no accident that these weeks begin and end with celebration and liberation. That is the story of the Jewish people, always getting up one more time than we fall. We invite you to remember, to commemorate, and to celebrate with us at Israel Shabbat on April 28.
