Passover and Belonging

The Torah instructs us to tell the story of the Exodus from Egypt. The Hebrew verb used is lehagid — from where we get the word Haggadah. Four times does the Torah mention that when children ask us about the reasons for Passover, it is a mitzvah to explain to them what happened.

Our ancient rabbis considered those four verses and concluded that each verse corresponds to four types of learners — one who is wise, one who is wicked, one who is simple, and one who does not know how to ask. We know it as the "Midrash of the Four Siblings." Of the four, the wicked and the one who doesn't know how to even ask seem to me the most interesting. What lesson can we learn from these two?

Notice that in the Passover *Haggadah*, the two do not ask a question. Although the wicked child presents their comment as a question, it is more a rhetorical question. The rejection of the wicked child is evident in the interpretation that the *Haggadah* provides, "for me, and NOT for you." But in fact, this answer is a forced reading of the text.

How do I know? Because the simple child is given an answer that includes the *same* verse, but without rejection. The message is clear: If one person does not know how to even ask the question, we must help them, engage them. The message of this Midrash applies to the rest of the year as well, because it teaches us that we all bear a responsibility to engage and involve every Jewish learner, even those who chose to separate from the community. Even the "wicked child" remains a part of our people.

If the 4 children represent four ways in which Jews relate to Judaism, then roughly 50% feel disconnected. From immemorial times, at any given time in history, half of all the Jews have been disengaged. Against that background, the message of the *Haggadah* is hope. We are taught never to give up on anyone. In *My People's Passover Haggadah*, we read:

"the Haggadah's [...] still gives each child a seat at the table. In doing so, the *Haggadah* embodies a profound insight articulated by *Numbers Rabbah* (8:4): "If you estrange those who are distant, you will ultimately estrange those who are near!"

Even if some Jews may ask a question that sounds dismissive, or if they do not know what to ask, we need to be ready to invite them in; everyone wants a sense of belonging. Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan taught that there are three basic forms of Jewish identity: we can identify as a Jew either by believing, behaving, or belonging. For Kaplan himself, the primary form of identity was belonging. Judaism is the religion of the Jewish people; it emerged out of the life experience of a people, and therefore it is the Jewish people who are responsible to shape Jewish religion in every generation. May we all find a place at the Seder table this year.

There is another reason to ask you to come back to services – potential new members. Many people who are shul shopping do so at services. This is usually their first stop. 



NEW WOMEN'S GROUP!

We have a new group for Jewish women called **JULIET**, which is an acronym for **J**ewish **U**nforgettable **L**adies Interested in **E**ating **T**ogether.

JULIET replaces the former women's group.

What is it?

Our mission statement: Inspired by Jewish values, we bring women together for friendship and learning. We offer support to Congregation Beth Torah and the wider Jewish community.

It is a social and educational group, not a sisterhood.



What does a typical meeting look like?

We start promptly at 1 pm. The first 30 minutes are for shmoozing and eating lunch. Each woman brings her own sack lunch and CBT will provide beverages, paper goods and plastic cutlery. The next 60 minutes is for our program, which usually includes a guest speaker.

Who can become a JULIET?

All Jewish women + non-Jewish wives of Jewish spouses are eligible. CBT membership is not required, so bring your friends, even if they are not members of our congregation. This group is for women of all ages and the programs will vary to reflect that philosophy.

What does it cost?

Nothing! Congregation Beth Torah is sponsoring **JULIET**, so there will be no charge for the first year of operation. At that time, we will reevaluate our financial status.

When do we meet?

ALL meetings occur at 1 pm on a Sunday, usually the last one of each month. You will be notified by email if we have to change the date.
