Remarks

Rabbi Javier Cattapan, Senior Rabbi

Twenty-five Years Serving the Jewish People

It is hard to believe that this Spring marks the 25th anniversary of my ordination as a rabbi. When I was a

seminary student at HUC-JIR in Cincinnati, every year, a group of rabbis would come to campus to receive their Doctor of Divinity degree, *honoris causa*, in appreciation for their service to the Jewish people. Obviously, my fellow students thought that they all seemed old and that 25 years was a long time into the future. What we did not know then is that two and half decades later, we would be "those" rabbis.

Before my admission to HUC, my plan was to become a Conservative rabbi at the rabbinical seminary I was already attending in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The decision to leave my home country and everything I had known was not an easy one. In part, it was prompted by the seminary's policy in place at that time that forbade ordaining openly gay rabbis. As it turned out, attending HUC was the best decision I've ever made in my career. The College-Institute welcomed me with open arms and made possible my becoming a rabbi as a complete, honest individual. I am thankful for my years in Cincinnati and cannot express enough how much impact the faculty and my classmates had on me during those formative years.

In 1998, I could not have imagined the many people I would be blessed to have as congregants, co-workers, and colleagues—including non-Jewish clergy—in the last twenty-five years. I met them while serving three congregations in Ohio, Indiana, and Kansas, and their influence has endured to this very day. Their respect and care, and, in many cases, their continued friendship, have enriched my life as a rabbi and human being in ways that words cannot express. And yes, even those who were sometimes a bit difficult to deal with taught me important lessons about patience and resiliency.

During the first week of May, I will travel to New York City to participate in the College-Institute's graduation ceremony, where, alongside many of my classmates, I will receive my Doctor of Divinity degree *honoris causa*. This time around, much to my surprise and delight, I will be one of the "old" rabbis!

Join the Interfaith Effort for Justice

On Tuesday, May 2 at 6:00 p.m., Beth Torah will join 25 other religious institutions in Johnson County to present solutions that create justice in our community. Since late summer of this year, 35 Beth Torah members have begun working on the congregation's largest social justice project. The coordinated efforts of our Good Faith Network will be presented at this Nehemiah Action, as the evening is known.

Hosting this event is **Resurrection**, a **United Methodist Church**, (Building **A) located at 13720 Roe Avenue in Leawood**. The evening marks the culmination of community conversations, research, analysis, and solutions that will be presented to policymakers in Johnson County.

The objective of the evening is much more than just sharing information with elected officeholders and appointed officials and other concerned citizens. Instead, the Good Faith Network seeks a commitment to action, the acceptance of a blueprint that can be adopted to eliminate major injustices within Johnson County. The blueprint presented to officials may need to be modified, but the ultimate objectives and outcomes need to remain intact.

This year's justice agenda involves the following three issues:

Mental Health Crisis Care was identified by Good Faith Network in last year's priority as a major concern for Johnson County. A primary solution offered by the Network was a crisis stabilization center that provides short-term stays for people in mental health crisis. The crisis center will decrease the community's use of emergency rooms and inpatient facilities.

Ending Homeless is another issue that was recognized last year. A study by Housing and Urban Development indicates that 180 individuals are homeless in Johnson County on any

Last but certainly not least, the winds of change have returned to Beth Torah. Rabbi Cattapan's contract calls for us to declare now, our intentions when his contract ends on June 30, 2024. We recently met with Rabbi and the decision was made not to renew his contract. A search committee is being formed and we will begin the journey of finding a new Senior Rabbi for our congregation. The process will be transparent, and we welcome input from everyone.

Please be assured that through the end of Rabbi's contract on June 30 2024, it will be business as usual at Beth Torah. Weekly Shabbat and High Holy Days services will continue as will all life cycle events. Plans are already underway for next year's Purim carnival, Chili Cook off and congregational Passover seder. Our second annual CBT backyard BBQ bash is June 24 and will be bigger and better than last year. Also in the works is a Las Vegas night, food trucks, and other surprises from the CBT Women's Group and our upcoming adult education events are too numerous to list.

Sadly, the rumor mill is already running at full steam. It's been brought to my attention that "some people" heard we are merging with Bnai Jehudah, the building is already up for sale, we are shutting down the WRS and we are merging the WRS with B'nai Jehudah. There is absolutely no truth to any of this and it has never come up for discussion since I have been President for the last two years. If you are hearing any of this nonsense, please disregard. Beth Torah is in transition. As in the past, we will rise and work together as a congregation to form our next chapter. We can say the same thing about Beth Torah that we can about the new baseball season: All things are possible.

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

BOW Committee



Hello again everyone! I'm going to take a little of your time to tell you about how your Beyond Our Walls committee continues working in the background as part of CBT. Most obviously, you know about our streaming and our app (If you don't, go visit our website to find out!). Since the app and streaming are the most obvious, I'll start with some interesting facts.

The CBT App

Where are we today: We've had about 45 new application downloads this year, and we are approaching 700 downloads since we began using the app, which came about a year after we started streaming. In April alone, the CBT app was opened over 200 times with over 700 uses from those launches. Our community also streamed over 100 videos. Doing the quick calendar math, you know that there aren't 100 shabbats in April. That means people are re-

watching portions, sharing our services, and generally staying in contact, even if they aren't in the building and are Beyond Our Walls.

Where do we want to expand: Our app supports messaging. This is a private way for Beth Torah to talk with Beth Torah, and not rely upon other systems that can be problematic for privacy. We're going to start some messaging for the Weiner Religious school. As we create new groups and social programs, we can create both chat and announcement groups to help stay coordinated with each other. Do you have a great social justice idea? Let us help you keep everyone talking and coordinated! Are you thinking about a social group or chavurah? Let us help you get coordinated and make your CBT communications simpler. *This is ultimately your tool, so let us know how you'd like to use the app.* If we can do it, we'll get it sorted with you.

What else does BOW support?

BOW is supporting some very cool projects. I want to emphasize "supporting" as these are our people, all of you, coming up with ideas that we are helping to take Beyond Our Walls. "Expand" means your ideas, your desires. To give you an idea, here's just a quick list for you of what is happening now.

- On our website, you can review any service you want. On the Virtual Sanctuary page, there are categories to help you narrow your search.
- Special programs, like the Beit programs, some Adult Education, social justice meetings, etc., have some level of BOW support. We even had one speaker ask to have theirs recorded for their own use.
- \Rightarrow Being the technical question and IT helpers for our staff.
- Did you know the Weiner Religious School held a Chocolate Seder? Well, you can see an overview at the end of the school year. We are working with our new principal, Morgan, to support her initiatives and further promote the Weiner Religious School.
- Most recently, our confirmation class of 5783/2023 is running an awesome project. Many of you either have, or will be receiving, an email about participating (so be careful with your email mass deletions!). These ladies are helping to document CBT's history and celebrate our Chai Members. These are members who have been **part of the congregation for over 18 years.** Some are young adults, some are older adults, and some are smack in the middle. That's incredible, joyous, and we want to celebrate these members. Our confirmands are scheduling short interviews that take just a few minutes, to ask 5 questions. They have a great start on the project and we'll begin publishing these short interviews soon, for everyone to share. Watch your app for more information. ©

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

given night. Throughout the year, 1,000 students in the community are precariously housed or homeless. The Network is advocating a comprehensive plan that includes a dedicated homeless coordinator.

Affordable Housing is an issue that was championed by Beth Torah Network members in our initial issues session and was the most frequently cited justice concern by all our Network members. The lack of affordable housing in Johnson County removes the opportunity for teachers, first responders, and service workers to reside in the community they serve. The Network seeks solutions that relate to incentivizing housing stock that can be affordable and long-term.
