We All Stood at Sinai

The Torah refers to the group of b'nei yisrael (Israelites) who come out of Egypt as a

"mixed multitude" of souls. A shared sense of purpose and destiny bound this diverse group. As a mixed multitude, they stood at Sinai, the climactic moment of Revelation and commitment. Our tradition teaches that a covenant was established between God and the Jewish people on that day. We read in the book of Deuteronomy, "I make this covenant, with its sanctions, not with you alone, both with those who are standing here with us this day before Adonai our God and with those who are not with us here this day" (Deut. 29:13-14).

To this day, synagogues continue to be diverse in ethnic backgrounds life journeys, and opinions. We are both many and one. Just as the whole community—past, present, and future—stood together at Sinai, we attempt to stand together today.

Beth Torah has been one for over thirty years, but we are also many. We are the continuation of previous congregations that nurtured and shaped us and a new, never-before-seen multitude. Just as we all stood at Sinai, we must all stand together as one congregation. As we begin to count the days between Passover and Shavuot, which celebrates our standing together at Sinai, we need to think about those who, for whatever reasons, sometimes find themselves "outside the tent" and may not feel that they stand with us. We should consider asking what we must do to bring them back inside. If our goal is the creation of a strong, sustaining, and inclusive congregation, how can we ensure that no one feels un-welcome?

In *Pirkei Avot* (Ethics of the Sages), we read, "Ben Zoma asked: "Who is wise? The one who learns from every person." (*Pirkei Avot* 4:1) Our rabbis taught: If one sees a crowd of Israelites, one says, "Blessed is the Wise One who understands secrets, for the mind of each is different from that of the other, just as the face of each is different from that of the other." (Talmud, B'rachot 58a).



President's Corner

Happy May Everyone,

In a few short days we will have the 2024 Beth Torah annual meeting. I would like to make sure everyone takes advantage of this opportunity to ask questions, discuss next year's budget, voice your opinions and wish Rabbi Cattapan a fond farewell in person.

When I think back over the three years of my presidency I can't help to think about where it all started and the journey I had getting us to today.

The WRS was in serious decline with enrollment spiraling downward. The board took our first difficult step and the necessary changes were made. Thank you Howard Pitler for stepping up and on very short notice getting us ready for what turned out to be a very successful school year. The Talmud / Torah committee was formed and it was filled with educators. They provided a wealth of knowledge, guidance and experience and helped move our religious school back in the right direction. Morgan Fasbinder joined us on a part time basis as principal and spent the balance of the school year imparting her knowledge and expertise as an educator keeping the WRS on a continued path upward. The following school year Morgan joined us on a full time basis as Director of Youth and Young Adult Education. Enrollment increased exponentially over the year as did our profile in the community. Morgan will be leaving us in a few short weeks to work at the Federation where she will continue to shine as she showcases her talents.

Tara Hyder left Beth Torah as office administrator for a position that better fit her financial background and experience. Shortly after Tara left, Jes Lindsay was hired as her replacement. Jes quickly fit in and made a difference until she decided to branch out on her own and start her own business. After Jes left, we decided to take some time to see what we really needed for this position so I stepped in and helped out as the acting Office Administrator. Aviva Symons left Beth Torah for her dream job as the coordinator of a large Jewish summer camp near San Francisco. Again, we took a step back to see what we really needed from her position as Director of Membership Services and left the position open. In March of 2023 Rabbi Cattapan and the board of trustees mutually decided to go our separate ways. Rabbi will be with us until June and then he will be off to begin his next chapter. By now you are probably thinking... "Wow, Larry. Everyone left on your watch!" Some changes were long overdue but for some, another more appealing opportunity came along and they took advantage of it just as anyone else would do. For some, the time was right for new horizons.

When I came in as President, our beautiful building and campus was in desperate need of a good cleaning and multiple repairs. Thanks to generous benefactors we were able to have the entire exterior of the building power washed and cleaned, the numerous bird holes on the exterior walls of the building were filled and the building was given a fresh coat of paint. Tired bushes were removed and new flowers were planted. Dead trees were removed and all of the trees were lifted. The parking lot had much needed repairs, sealed and parking lanes were restriped.

The interior of the building had a long list of deferred maintenance repairs completed. We had a Homeland Security Grant that allowed us to upgrade our camera system, install blast resistant film on the windows, and other enhanced security upgrades. We also had the front entryway doors overhauled.

We brought back the Tekiah. Scott Latman has done a tremendous job as the editor. We also brought back the Chili Cookoff and started a new tradition with our annual BBQ.

Backyard services in the summer are a big hit as are the amazing and creative services and music programs throughout the year. We had Tikkun-KC painting parties and the sweet sounds of the Jewbie Brothers filled the air. Thank you, Jill Maidoff, for the amazing Adult Education programs you continue to bring us.

We brought in our first "real" Executive Director (Damien Timms) since Laura Intfen left years ago and we were "Oh" so close finding our next spiritual leader.

We faced many financial challenges like adding security guards to most events and we all banded together as a community when we all needed a collective hug.

The fact that I could go on for several more paragraphs tells you how much has been accomplished in the last three years. I cannot thank the entire board of trustees enough for all your help through every challenge, speed bump and roadblock. Nobody realizes how much time away from your families and free time you spent getting Beth Torah through the last three years.

The challenges are not over and will not be any easier. I pray the next board will be able to work together and solve the many problems that you will face. Beth Torah is a special place filled with special people. I am so honored that I had the opportunity to be your president.


